Our favourite activity was the zipline as we raced each other down it.





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
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
Girls embrace STEM Outreach Day

On Wed 5th June, we hosted our second 'Girls in STEM' Extravaganza Day for this year are were delighted to welcome Simonside, Beech Hill and St Robert's Primary Schools and New Hartley First School to Westfield.









Mrs Monica Mason kindly came in to talk to the girls about her career journey as a Pharmacist. She talked about her school life and the subjects she enjoyed when she was in primary school. She also talked in depth about the value of teamwork and her passion for her work at the RVI.



Mrs Swift organised for representatives from the British Army to run a robotics workshop for KS3 pupils. The girls learnt some valuable lessons on the type of roles available in the British Army and got the girls to think about the use of STEM skills in the British Army, e.g. planning, testing, teamwork and exploring.

Another skill I learnt is the importance of patience when it comes to problem-solving; not everything is going to go smoothly, and that's okay. In the end, it created some lovely memories which I now share with the girls acting in the play. Of course, directing a play wasn't easy but it was worth all of our hard work and dedication to see the end result; a very rewarding production that both Noah and I were so proud of.
